When used in a medically supervised clinical setting, ketamine is administered in a relatively low dosage over a period of 40 minutes to 1 hour. If you opt for this type of therapy you will be continually monitored during your treatment session to make sure you don't experience any side effects. Your doctor will first go over your medical history and ask about any prescription or recreationally drugs you may be taken before determining if you are a candidate for this type of treatment.

Once an individualized treatment plan has been created for you, a member of your healthcare team will schedule you for about 6 ketamine infusion treatments spread out over a course of 3 weeks. Depending on your results, your doctor may recommend a booster session every month or so to ensure you continue to experience maximal relief from your symptoms.

Ketamine was approved for use in the United States in the 1970s as an anesthesia during medical procedures and as a strong analgesia to bring to relief to postoperative pain. The current scientific research is inconclusive as to whether or not it offers any help for neuropathic or cancer pain.ⁱⁱⁱ
